
- In accordance with federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs, are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, gender identity (including gender expression), sexual orientation, disability, age, marital status, family/parental status, income derived from a public assistance program, political beliefs, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity, in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA (not all bases apply to all programs). Remedies and complaint filing deadlines vary by program or incident.
- Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g., Braille, large print, audiotape, American Sign Language, etc.) should contact the responsible agency or USDA's TARGET Center at (202) 720-2600 (voice and TTY) or contact USDA through the Federal Relay Service at (800) 877-8339. Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English.


USDA NIFA Disaster Response

- Partnerships with the Land-Grant University System and government, private, and nonprofit organizations






- Translates research into action









- New funding opportunity in FY22
- Project types are Extension and Integrated (Research and Extension)



A1712 program purpose








Designed to rapidly deploy strategies and fill knowledge and information gaps to protect the nation's food and agricultural supply chains during and after weather-related disasters.

Strategies should buffer effects from disasters and ensure availability of an accessible, safe, nutritious, affordable, and abundant food supply.

Projects must directly address effects associated with an extreme weather event or disaster.

Applicants will have the opportunity to justify the need for funding based upon localized impacts.



A1712 program details

This program seeks applications that:



Focus on critical and urgent solutions in rapid response to disaster impacts on the nation's food and agricultural systems.



Clearly describe short-term deliverables within 3 months of award receipt.



Clearly define the geographic scope of the project as related to the weather-related event or disaster.

Applications must address one or more of the following:



Agroecosystem Resilience



Commodity & Nutrition Security



Health, Well-Being, & Safety
